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
A NOTE FROM... the chairman

Recognition and appreciation lie at the heart of our annual Awards ceremony. Once again, there was so much to applaud when we gathered at the All England Club to give a huge shout-out to all our players, volunteers, officials, coaches, helpers, and everyone else that makes Surrey Tennis such a great county to be involved with. Much more is revealed about their achievements and contributions in this edition of the Surrey Tennis Quarterly. It also shows the strength-in-depth of the game in Britain.

Talking of talent and depth, one statistic you might not be aware of is that the UK is now the leader in tennis participation across the world! Of the 106 million people playing tennis across the world, an increase of 26% in the past five years, Great Britain has the highest percentage of the population playing tennis of any of the 199 nations who contributed to a recent International Tennis Federation

(ITF) report. The health of the game and its grass-roots popularity is something the LTA, counties, and government have worked hard to achieve as part of the vision of "Tennis Opened Up".

Grass-roots is where it all begins, which is a timely reminder it is only a month before the first lawn tennis championship of the season begins. This will be held in Birmingham starting June 2nd - a combined men's and women's tournament for the first time. The following week will see the return of a tour level women's event in London for the first time in over 50 years, as The Queen's Club plays host to a WTA 500 event, followed by the hugely popular men's ATP 500 tournament in the usual slot. Eastbourne precedes Wimbledon. We would like to wish everyone involved in Surrey a wonderful season of lawn tennis!





IN THIS EDITION OF JUSTIN'S TIPS: LEARN HOW TIMING YOUR ENERGY RELEASE JUST BEFORE CONTACT CAN MAXIMISE POWER AND SHOT QUALITY.

Just like in boxing, golf, hockey, and every sport where contact is key, try to release the energy into the tennis ball just before contact.

The 'spark' or 'pulse' is delivered more cleanly when lined up relatively quietly prior to the moment the racket releases its energy.

The timing of the 'strike' is critical to the quality—and therefore the effectiveness – of the shot. Remember: FIRE – JUST – PRIOR

So next time you take to the court- whether it's a Wilson Surrey League match, a club tournament, or any other event - keep this tip in the back of your mind. Remember, focus is key.

to attend our Celebration of Surrey
Tennis which took place on a warm,
sunny afternoon at the AELTC, Church
Road, Wimbledon on the afternoon of
the 12th April 2025.

Guests began arriving for drinks in the Terrace Room in Court Number 1 from 3pm. With the doors out onto the balcony thrown open, our jazz band from the London Pianoforte Network, dressed in Wimbledon colours, could be heard playing inside and out. At the back of the room, Surrey FaceBooth had set up a photobooth which was popular with our junior and adult guests alike. Robert Bone was circulating round the guests demonstrating his amazing close-up magic and Leo from Wilkinson Photography was on hand to take photos throughout the event.

At 3:30, our County Cup players were called outside to have their photo taken in front of the Fred Perry statue. If you go to the Summer County Week at Devonshire Park in July, look out for their photo in the programme.

Guests then made their way to their tables in the Courtside Room for the LTA Awards. Winners were introduced and invited up on stage to collect their trophy from our Surrey Tennis President, Roy Staniland, assisted by David Lovejoy (our retiring Chair of Awards), and given a chance to speak by our compere, Surrey Tennis Performance Manager Justin Sherring. We were very sad that Max England, from this year's The Apprentice, was ill and could not be with us, but Justin did a great job in his absence.

Dinner and more photobooth visits were the order of the day from 5:00–6:00, after which we introduced as many Surrey County Cup players as could be there. We started with our four very special junior player awards – our Endeavour and Progress Cups. We were especially pleased that Ollie Bonding and Liv Zingg could be there.

They both gave an inspiring insight into their tennis journeys which many of the younger County Cup players found very interesting. Tomas Gabor couldn't be with us, but his mum Irena and coach Alison Taylor were on hand to give their views on what a player's support team contributes to a player's success.

Then we turned our attention to all the players who contributed to Surrey winning the LTA County Cup Race. As we progressed through the age groups, the number of players got fewer and fewer – as many were already away competing – but we still had a good turnout from last year's 98U, 108U, 118U, 128U, 148U and

18&U teams. Our juniors did so well, our 11s, 14s and 18s were chosen by the LTA to represent England in the Four Nations Cup in Ireland, and they only went and won it! Not to be outdone, our men's Summer County Cup team were the national champions for the second time in a row, and our ladies worked very hard to maintain their position in Division 1 too. We also had representation of our Winter County Cup teams on hand to collect their trophies. The final Race team acknowledged were our Over 35s teams.


For the first time, we selected a team to be our Senior County Cup Team of the Year. This went to our men's

Over 50 team, who were one of our national finalists, but the only one to win all of their rubbers. While the 14 Surrey Senior teams do not contribute to the County Cup Race points, they are a very important part of the Surrey Tennis family of players.

A KNOCKOUT EVENT

The Surrey Knockouts are twiceyearly competitions known as the Winter and Summer Knockouts.

Players enter online, and in the most recent Winter Knockouts we had 345 entries, many of whom competed in multiple events. For this summer, over 400 players have signed up to take part.

Once the draws are made, players receive their first-round details from the Surrey Tennis volunteer responsible for that specific event. We're supported by a fantastic team of 11 volunteers who oversee 20 events, covering a range of age groups from open categories to Over 65s, in both singles and doubles formats.

Players are informed of their opponent's name and contact details, who has home advantage, and by what date the match must be completed. The home player(s) is then expected to offer at least three possible dates to arrange the match.

Winners progress to the next round, and the competition continues...

We regularly receive feedback from players saying how much they enjoy meeting new people and taking part – especially those competing for the first time!

The finals of the Winter Knockouts, which began back in October, were held on 22 March at Magdalen Park Lawn Tennis Club. The club has been a wonderful host for the past few years, and once again made everyone feel extremely welcome. Of the 20 finals scheduled, just one was postponed due to a player being stranded abroad during the unexpected Heathrow Airport closure. Despite that, the day was action-packed, with high-quality tennis across six courts.

Spectators came out in force to support their players, and there was a fantastic atmosphere throughout the club. Many took full advantage of the food and drink available on the day too. Although the weather forecast looked bleak, we were incredibly lucky – while storms raged around us, we had only a few minutes of light drizzle and managed to play through the day without interruption.

The event was refereed by our regular, highly experienced official Carole Heritage, who expertly juggled the day's match schedule.

The Men's Singles title was won by top seed Simon Bramwell, who came from a set down to defeat second seed Paul Marchant in a competitive final.

In the Men's Doubles, Robert Mitchell and Jorge Wilton claimed victory in two close sets.

Lyla Read had a busy – and incredibly successful – day. She started in the Ladies' Singles, defeating Olivia Dawkins after a tight first–set tiebreak, and never looked back. She then teamed up with Samantha Haslett in the Ladies' Doubles. Unseeded and up against the experienced duo of Olivia Berry and Lowri James, they came through a tight second set full of long games to claim the title.

Immediately after, Lyla returned to court with her dad Greg for the Mixed Doubles final. Having beaten previous winners in the semi-finals, they faced another strong pair – Caroline Joy and Ben Causer – and proved too strong on the day.

Lyla, who is only 14, made history by taking home all three main titles – a remarkable achievement and certainly a name to watch!

The Summer Knockout finals will take place at Oxshott Village Sports Club on Sunday 27 July. If you're not playing, do come along and enjoy some brilliant competitive tennis!

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EWELL CASTLE REPRESENT ENGLAND

Students from Ewell Castle School in Surrey took home a silver and a bronze medal after representing England at the International Schools Federation U₁₅ Gymnasiade event in Serbia.

The competition – an international multi-sport event for countries all over the world – featured 25 sports including tennis.

Ewell Castle were selected to represent England in the event after winning the LTA Youth Schools Year 788 competition last year.

Nicholas Kizys and Daniel Pratt took home the silver medal in the boys' doubles event with a stellar run to the final before losing out to Chinese duo Yaoyu Yang and Junze Wu. Meanwhile, Neo Armus reached the semi-finals of the boys' singles before closing out a successful week with victory against Talha Bulut to clinch the bronze medal.

Congratulations to the whole team on a brilliant week competing against top opposition from around the world.

SURREY SCHOOLS FESTIVAL 2025: A RESOUNDING SUCCESS

he 2025 Surrey Schools Festival was one for the history books – not only in numbers but in the incredible energy and sportsmanship shown by every player, teacher and supporter involved.

This year's event saw 45 schools, 248 teams and an impressive 496 players take to the courts, showcasing the continued strength of schools tennis across the county. From the first serve to the final point, the spirit of the competition was nothing short of inspirational.

Surrey has a long and proud history of school tennis, and this year's festival reaffirmed its importance as a cornerstone of our Surrey Tennis community. With so many pupils taking part — many representing their schools for the very first time — it's clear that this event continues to play a vital role in opening up the sport and giving young players a chance to experience competitive tennis in a fun, inclusive environment.

The atmosphereover the two days was electric. Players gave their all on court, not just to record wins for their school but in the way they encouraged teammates, respected opponents and embraced the spirit of the game. As noted in the referee's report, the attitude and behaviour from all involved was exemplary, and this tone was set early on thanks to the incredible enthusiasm from school staff.

To see nearly 500 players representing their schools with such pride is exactly what grassroots tennis is all about.





The support from teachers cannot be overstated. Across all age groups and match formats, their energy, encouragement and sheer commitment to making the day a success was on full display. From managing teams and scorecards to boosting morale and rallying players through long matches, their dedication helped create a memorable experience for every child taking part.

Fun events like the Surrey Schools Festival are about far more than match wins and scorelines. They're about creating memories, building confidence and helping young people discover a lifelong love of tennis. It was particularly heartening to see how many of the players, regardless of ability or result, left with smiles on their faces, having made new friends and enjoyed the experience of representing their school with pride.

This year's event was also a testament to the growing diversity and inclusivity within the sport. We saw new schools enter for the first time, a wider mix of teams across different year groups, and more schools embracing the opportunity to make tennis a bigger part of their sporting offer.

As we look ahead, the Surrey Schools Festival will continue to play a key role in our mission to grow grassroots tennis within schools across Surrey. With participation numbers like these and so much appetite from our Surrey schools, the future looks bright!

A huge thank you to every teacher, pupil, volunteer and parent who helped make this year's event such a success. You've not only supported the next generation of tennis players - you've inspired them.

A TRUE SURREY LEGEND RETIRES FROM VOLUNTEERING ROLE

Anne Pitt, reflects on her volunteering career

Volunteering in tennis has been a rewarding and enriching experience that has allowed me to give back to the sport I love, while supporting the venue where I enjoyed my tennis from when I joined in 1976—namely, Woking Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club.

Once my children reached school age (1986), I took on the role of Hon. Sec. Now I am going to make myself feel very old... no computers back then! All membership records were kept in a handwritten card index. I attended committee meetings complete with my shorthand notebook, wrote minutes by hand, and typed them up for distribution by post. I attended local fixture meetings with a huge sheet of paper, all colour-coded for the various teams I needed to arrange matches for throughout the season. No spreadsheets for me! I worked

from home; phone calls galore (much to the irritation of my family), and no emails, text messages, or WhatsApp to help. I remember every year having to drive across Surrey to pick up the club's allocation of Wimbledon tickets (valuable cargo), then distributing them to the lucky winners of a laborious ballot system.

However, the rewards were great—seeing the club thrive and go from strength to strength, with a brilliant group of coaches and enthusiastic volunteers. Together, we became involved in the junior programme at the club, running a very popular club night every Friday. We started an ITF Vets Tournament (not dog doctors, as one of our members thought!). Following on from this, for many years I was Hon. Sec of the local Chaucer League; from match cards and results being sent out by post to being involved in creating an interactive website where results could

be recorded online.

In amongst all this, I was honoured to be invited to sit on the Tennis Surrey (now Surrey Tennis!) Council. Another very rewarding post—seeing firsthand the huge commitment of so many willing volunteers running tennis in Surrey, and getting to understand the many different ways that our clubs are run. The Council comprised an eclectic group of people, all with very different skill sets, which was fascinating to be a part of and to learn so much from them and their various experiences knowledge I was able to share with WLTCC. My final volunteering role has been running the Men's Open Doubles Knockout competition. Fortunately, all done via email, with few hiccups and matches played in good spirit, and results passed on to me promptly without the need to chase... too often.

The impact of volunteering in tennis extends far beyond the immediate tasks and responsibilities. Volunteers create a sense of community, foster a love for the sport, and inspire others to get involved. The efforts of volunteers should lead to increased participation, improved facilities, and a stronger support network for players of all ages. Moreover, volunteering has provided me with personal satisfaction, skill development—for me this mostly involved being forced to become computer literate—but most importantly, the opportunity to form lasting friendships.

JACK DRAPER MAKES SURREY HISTORY

Our very own Jack Draper has made Surrey Tennis history by breaking into the worlds ATP top 10 rankings after claiming his first Masters 1000 title at Indian Wells!

The 23-year-old from Sutton defeated world No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the semi-finals before overpowering Holger Rune 6–2, 6–2 in the final – arguably the biggest win of his career so far. In doing so, Jack joins an elite group of British men to crack the top 10 in the Open Era, alongside legends like Andy Murray, Tim Henman, and Greg Rusedski.

From his early days at Sutton Tennis & Squash Club to the global stage, Jack's journey is an inspiration to young players right across Surrey.



JODIE BURRAGE IMPRESSES AT BJK CUP


Surrey's own Jodie Burrage delivered a standout performance at the 2025 Billie Jean King Cup Qualifiers, playing a pivotal role in Great Britain's advancement to the Finals in Shenzhen this September

Burrage was called up to the Lexus GB squad following Emma Raducanu's withdrawal. Seizing the opportunity, she partnered with Katie Boulter in a decisive doubles match against the Netherlands. Despite their limited experience as a duo, the pair showcased exceptional synergy and dominated their opponents, Suzan Lamens and Demi Schuurs, with a commanding 6-2, 6-2 victory.

Reflecting on the match, Burrage expressed her pride: "That was my first win for my country – I'm unbelievably proud to say that. It was great the way the day unfolded, the pressure was on us but we came out firing and I was very happy to do it with one of my best friends as well."

Captain Anne Keothavong's strategic decision to pair Burrage with Boulter, opting for their raw power over traditional doubles experience, proved to be a masterstroke. Their victory not only secured Great Britain's spot in the Finals but also highlighted the depth and resilience of the team.

Burrage's performance in The Hague underscores her growing prominence in British tennis. Burrage's contribution serves as a testament to the strength and potential of British women's tennis and also marks an exciting future for womens and girls tennis across Surrey. Well done Jodie!



While there is no hard deadline to join in 2025, venues wishing to compete in the 2025/2026 Winter competition season must become members by then, so we encourage early action to avoid missing out.

We understand that this is a significant change for many of our Surrey venues, schools and local authorities, and we appreciate that it may raise a number of questions – such as:

- How is Surrey Tennis membership different to LTA Registration?

ANYONE FOR REAL TENNIS?

nyone for tennis? Good, let's play – inside, of course. But watch out for Hazards – taking a ball off the tambour is tricky. Remember that a shot in the grille is a sure-fire winner, as is one in the winning gallery. If you are 40-love down, do what you can to set a chase, even if it's only 'chase a yard worse', or even 'chase the line'. Or blast a winning ball into the dedans; off the wall is the best tactic here.

Clear as mud? Don't worry, all will become clear after a few hours on the Real Tennis court inside Hampton Court Palace, a hidden jewel in the stunning historic building just over the Thames. The ancestral home of Real Tennis since 1530, this ancient game of kings (and commoners) is still played here today by 500+ dedicated members of the Royal Tennis Court Club (RTC) – and it's open to all.

Real Tennis lays claim to being the world's oldest racquet sport – that imposter Lawn Tennis evolved from it. It is similar to the lawn game in scoring (15-love, deuce, advantage, game, set, match) but different in many ways – all of them interesting. It is played indoors in what might be described as a squash court on steroids. There's tactics, spin, cut (the phrase 'cut to the chase' came from Real Tennis), speed, aggression, and subtlety. There are serves so fiendishly difficult to return they have their own names: the Railroad, the Bobble, the Boomerang (which rarely comes back)

Sometimes called 'chess on a tennis court' Real Tennis can be played by all ages and levels of ability. RTC members include teenagers taking their first lessons and 80+ year-old players, male and female, who might now creak a bit on court



but can still blast a ball at 90mph through a letterbox at 40 paces on their day.

A clever handicap system means players of unequal abilities can still have a tight match. There are singles and doubles games on offer. There are tournaments, local and national, and opportunities for private lessons from some of the top players in the world. There are social functions in the Club garden, and cosy private clubrooms in which to unwind after a match, in front of a roaring fire, glass of wine in hand, while puzzled palace visitors peer through the panes at your private palatial paradise.


Joining the club is simple: an introductory lesson with a top Professional is advised first. If smitten, there is an agerelated joining fee, quarterly subs and an hour's singles is £15 per person. For playing on one of the world's oldest sports courts, in a Royal palace, it's great value. Chase on!

BRITISH OPEN RETURNS TO ROEHAMPTON AS STARS PREPARE FOR WIMBLEDON



Wheelchair and junior tennis return to the grass courts of Roehampton this summer, as tickets go on sale for the Lexus British Open, the final UK-based event before The Championships, Wimbledon.

Taking place in the run-up to SW19, the event promises world-class tennis and a close-up experience with some of the sport's most exciting names. British Paralympic stars Alfie Hewett, Gordon Reid, Andy Lapthorne and Lucy Shuker will headline the wheelchair competitions, joined by rising stars from the global junior circuit, including past champions of the US Open and other Grand Slams.

Now in its second year as a combined event, the British Open will once again feature both ITF J300 junior events and elite UNIQLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour draws across men's, women's and quad categories. With Roehampton's grass courts offering the perfect tune-up for Wimbledon, the event continues to grow in status and atmosphere.

Speaking about the tournament, Wimbledon champion Alfie Hewett said: "It's becoming one of the standout events in the wheelchair tennis calendar. Fans can get up close, see the biggest stars, and experience a brilliant atmosphere in a unique setting."

INCLUSIVITY FUND SUCCESS STORY

Surrey Tennis launched its Inclusivity Fund at the end of last year. This is designed to provide financial assistance for projects that are being delivered by Surrey registered venues and coaches which promote diversity and inclusion in tennis and padel and increase participation to under-represented communities.

One project that we have recently supported is Andy Jeffrey from Sutton Tennis Academy. Andy delivers tennis sessions to the Royal Marsden Children's hospital. The sessions are 1 hour long and are delivered weekly. They are offered to children receiving cancer treatment at the hospital. They have between 4–8 children attend each week and ages range from 3–15 years old. The sessions are all delivered on site.

The sessions are provided as part of their PE education as they cannot attend school during treatment. It is also the first time most children experience tennis.

Surrey Tennis are thrilled that the Inclusivity Fund has been able to provide additional support to enable the sessions to continue to thrive and offer light relief to young patients at the Royal Marsden.

SURREY coaching



We sat down with Ana Lopez, our latest Coach of the Quarter, to discuss her journey from Spain to Surrey, her coaching philosophy, the challenges she's overcome, and what drives her to inspire the next generation of players.

Growing up in Spain, how has your international background influenced your approach to tennis and your experience within the UK tennis community?

Coming from a Spanish background has definitely shaped how I coach. In Spain, training is centred around discipline, mental toughness and consistency, and I try to bring that mindset to my sessions here in the UK. Coaching here has exposed me to a range of styles and approaches, which has helped me grow as a coach and better connect with players and fellow coaches.

Growing up, were there any other sports you played? Was tennis always the goal?

I played a few sports growing up – mostly team sports like basketball – but tennis was always my passion. My dad and sister both played, so it was always part of my life. Whether or not it became a career, I was always working towards playing at a high level.

How has your approach to getting the best out of players evolved over the years?

At the start of my coaching journey, I focused heavily on technique. But over time, I've realised how important confidence, mindset and resilience are in performance. Every player is different, with different personalities and challenges, so my approach is now much more about creating an environment where they can grow, compete and enjoy the process.

Have there been any mentors who've significantly shaped your coaching journey?

Absolutely. I've been lucky to learn from some brilliant mentors – Alison and Roger Taylor, who continue to mentor me today. They taught me the value of patience and long-term development, and that coaching isn't just about chasing results. They also showed me how important it is to genuinely care about players, not just as athletes but as people.

What challenges have you faced, and how have you overcome them?

One of the biggest challenges has been breaking through stereotypes as a female coach in what is still a maledominated field. I've had to prove myself and work hard to earn the respect of players – and sometimes other coaches. But those challenges have motivated me. Coaching isn't about gender – it's about knowledge, leadership and the ability to connect with players.

What are your short- and long-term goals within tennis?

Short-term, I'm focused on completing my Level 4 Senior Performance course this year and continuing to support the competitive juniors in our programme at Esher. Long-term, I'd like to take on more leadership within performance coaching – whether that's mentoring younger coaches, working with national-level players or creating inclusive environments that keep more girls in the sport.

What's your approach to inspiring the next generation of players?

I believe in building a club environment where players feel supported, motivated and excited to train. Hard work can be fun, and I try to lead by example. Being a positive role model helps younger players grow not just in tennis but in confidence too.

What have you enjoyed most about being part of the Surrey Tennis community?

The sense of community. There's a real passion for tennis in Surrey, and I love being surrounded by coaches, players and parents who are all pulling in the same direction – developing talent and keeping the game thriving.

And finally – what do you enjoy beyond tennis?

enjoy going to the gym and doing Pilates, which helps me stay physically strong and mentally sharp. I also love a good spa day – recovery and self-care are so important when you're constantly giving energy to others. Travelling has helped me connect with people from different cultures and brought fresh ideas into my coaching. All of this keeps me balanced, energised and ready to give my best to the players and the programme.

LTA & UK PADEL PARTNER TO ELEVATE PADEL COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The LTA has announced a new strategic partnership with UK PADEL to support and expand the UK PADEL County Championships, which will now be officially sanctioned as a Grade 3 event starting in 2024. This means players are now able to earn LTA ranking points, marking a major step forward for the sport's domestic competitive structure.
